McDougall's victory propelled the Maroons to a 30-32 edge over Butte High in team competition.

In the ongoing seven-year Harry "Swede" Dahlberg scoring challenge, the Purples still lead with 222 points, and the Maroons have 241. Next year's race will decide which team retires the trophy to its school, and Central will need a lop-sided victory to do so.

Dahlberg, the legionary Butte High coach, died earlier this year (article below).



Harry Dahlberg: **A Great Career**

It would be hard to imagine a fuller, more influential life than the one that ended June 1 in Butte. Mont., for Harry (Swede) Dahlberg, who died at 74 on a fishing trip. Dahlberg, whose brother

His basketball teams won four state tournaments: In 1924, 1925, 1928 and 1932. His coaching span in that sport ran from 1923-1952.

Track and field might have been the sport he loved coaching best and his teams responded with 12 Montana Interscholastic championships. The first came in 1924 and the last in 1966, his last acative year, when his spikers won "one for Swede," the 60th Interscholastic. His cross-country team was champion in 1964. *

A Little Halftime Psychology

The Butte School Board recognized Dahlberg's great 44 years with these words, upon his retirement after the 1966 season:

"His long and distinguished career is one which may 'never again be paralleled in the annals of our communi-

Harry Dahlberg served in the Navy during World War - and was an Army physical education instructor in World War II.

He coached the kids with a keen psychological touch, but without undue dramatics.

R. R. (Shag) Miller, manager of Butte's KBOW Radio and a trackman under Dahlberg at Butte High, recalled:

"Once when his team was getting racked up by rug-ged opposition, trailing 13-12 at the half, he pulled a Knute Rockne. He didn't go near his players during the halftime intermission. Instead, he locked his door to his . . . office and sat at his desk with his hat pulled

down over his face. "His office was glass-enclosed and he was in full view of the players in the dressing room. Just before the resumption of the game he walked out into the locker room and said, 'It's all right with me if you want to play like a bunch of girls. But I don't want to be seen on the streets with you tomorrow, if you lose as you're losing now. You're not trying.' Dahlberg's kids went back out and won it 24-20

He coached two players who went to the National Football League, Milt Popovich and Leonard Noyes, and three-East-West Shrine Game performers, Popovich, Eso Naranche and Tom Davis. Asked who was the greatest, Dahlberg always would respond, "They've all been great."
